Featured Project Banner Greenhouses

Banner Greenhouses of Nebo, NC received a grant from USDA's Rural Energy For America Program (REAP), for energy efficiency upgrades. The grant provides for 25% of the project costs, which amounts to \$16,840.

Waste Reduction Partners provided the energy audit used in the grant application. Total annual energy cost savings for this project is \$34,976. Net project costs (Total cost – USDA grant) of \$49,347 results in a 1.4 year payback.
